

**CITY OF COCONUT CREEK
BUSINESS IMPACT ESTIMATE**

1. Summary of Ordinance No. 2024-031:

The current detail rate for off-duty firefighter/paramedics and fire inspectors is proposed to be increased to make it consistent with the terms used in the most recent Fire Collective Bargaining Agreement ratified by the Commission and Fire Department procedures. The increase would benefit public safety by having firefighter/paramedics on scene with large gatherings ready to respond to emergencies immediately.

2. Estimate of the Direct Economic Impact of the proposed ordinance on private, for-profit businesses in the City:

a. An estimate of direct compliance costs that businesses may reasonably incur if the ordinance is enacted.

There is language in the ordinance that allows 501(C)3 organizations to request a fee waiver. The approximate cost of the fee increase is expected to be nominal to businesses requesting fire/EMS details (less than a \$1,000 total a year).

b. Identification of any new charge or fee on businesses subject to the proposed ordinance or for which businesses will be financially responsible.

Slight increase in existing fees (less than a \$1,000 dollars per year).

c. An estimate of the City's regulatory costs, including an estimate of revenues from any new charges or fees that will be imposed on businesses to cover such costs.

It is a recovery cost not a revenue generating fee. Only businesses that request an off-duty detail for fire-fighters/ paramedics will incur the fee.

3. A good faith estimate of the number of businesses likely to be impacted by the ordinance.

The number of businesses likely to be impacted is less than five (5).

4. Any additional information the City Commission may determine to be useful.
